Transfer Equivalencies

The Speech, Language and Hearing Sciences (SLHS) department has reviewed the speech-language pathology coursework at Sacred Heart University, and the coursework in Communication Disorders at Southern Connecticut State University to determine their equivalence to the UConn SLHS curriculum. Below are how each institution's respective courses would transfer to the University of Connecticut's Speech, Language and Hearing Sciences undergraduate curriculum.

To graduate from the University of Connecticut a student must complete at least 30 credits in residence and meet all [general education](#) and [major](#) requirements. In addition, a majority of major credits (51%) must be completed at the University of Connecticut to receive a UConn SLHS degree. Please note that courses that transfer in as generic credit cannot satisfy SLHS core or elective requirements.
